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Launching your child into an artistic profession

-What started as a local theatre Festival for young people has become a launch pad for young professionals across the GTA.

September 9th 2013, Toronto – **The Paprika Festival** has announced its call for applicants to enrol in its 13th season of professional theatre mentorship for young people. The Festival has become a significant bridge for young artists entering the field of professional theatre. This is because the program unlike any in Toronto, is centered upon mentorship in the practice of both creating and successfully producing live performance.

About the Festival

The Paprika Festival, a playful title coined by past Artistic Director of the Tarragon Theatre, **Urjo Kareda** (1982-2001), was started twelve years ago by an eighteen-year old who wanted a professional theatre program for people like him. **Anthony Furey**, now a columnist for the Ottawa Sun, ignited something that, to date, has affected the lives of nearly a thousand young people, many of which now work professionally in the arts community. This year marks the first time that Paprika will step outside of the walls of the Tarragon Theatre, in a new model that will bring the Festival to different communities across the city.

"We are excited to see Paprika explore new spaces and relationships over the next few years – our community will benefit enormously from the energy these young artists bring to their theatres. This May, her latest play, *Vitals*, will be produced by the award winning independent theatre company Outside the March in association with Theatre Passe Muraille. Other Festival Alumni include: Mitchell Cushman who joined the Festival as a young director and is now a seasoned director with credits at Mirvish, SummerWorks and across Canada. Charlotte Corbeil-Coleman, a playwright with credits at Factory Theatre and abroad, spent several years at with Paprika. Johnnie Walker, runs his own theatre company in

Toronto which has produced numerous hit shows at both the Fringe Festival and SummerWorks.
